I am proud to share the impact Orchards Children’s Services has had on the lives of thousands of children and families across Michigan this past year. Through our expanding services and support, we have increased access to care for thousands of Michiganders, ensuring that more children and families receive the vital assistance they need. We are pleased to announce that, through these initiatives and programs, we now serve over 10,000 children. Through a broad spectrum of programs, including family preservation, foster care and adoption services, mental and behavioral health counseling, college scholarships, and more, we are changing lives and providing opportunities for growth and healing. Each of these services represents a lifeline, a stepping-stone, and a beacon of hope for those we serve.

This year, we began the MI Family Together program pilot in partnership with the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS). This innovative program increases access to and flexibility of services for children and families in our family preservation services, allowing us to extend our reach to families struggling to access care; providing families with pragmatic strength-based support, within their own homes. Working closely with MDHHS, we have made significant strides in improving the quality and availability of the support we provide.

Thanks to the generosity of Ford Motor Company and other incredible donors and volunteers, we renovated and refreshed our visitation rooms. This renovation sent a powerful message to the children and families we serve, that their community supports them, believes in them, and wants them to have a comfortable place to visit while working toward reunification. This initiative also demonstrated to our staff that their work is deeply valued, and that the community recognizes their vital contributions.

Looking ahead to 2025, we are focused on ongoing advocacy for the support, safety, and security of the children, families, and workers at Orchards Children’s Services and in child welfare services as a whole. We are also excited to further expand our clinical services, increasing our capacity to provide trauma-specific support and services to those with PTSD or who have experienced traumatic events. These goals for 2025 underscore our commitment to addressing the evolving needs of our community with compassion and innovation.

As we look toward the future, I am inspired by the advancements we continue to make and the boundless opportunities that lie ahead. Your support and compassion help drive our mission, and together, we will continue to strengthen communities through quality services to children and families across Michigan.

Who we are

We are Orchards. Strengthening the community through quality services to children and families is our mission—both in words and actions. We exist for one purpose: to serve children and families healing from the trauma of abuse and neglect.

Founded in 1962 by the National Council of Jewish Women (NCJW) Greater Detroit Section as a single residential group home for seven boys with emotional impairments, Orchards Children’s Services now serves over 10,000 children across Michigan. Our organization began because a small, courageous group of women dared to question how things had been done in the past and were driven to create a better future. And that same spirit has guided us ever since.

We believe in engaging individuals as active participants in building their own future. By working in partnership with parents, relatives, foster parents and youth in their households and communities, we empower families to achieve stability and long-term self-sufficiency in safe and caring environments.



What we do

Orchards Children’s Services provides critical services designed to protect and support children during times of family crisis, instability, and uncertainty, ensuring access to safe and nurturing environments. Through diverse programs tailored to meet the varying needs of our clients, we create opportunities that allow youth and families to transcend past experiences and break cycles of adversity like poverty and generational trauma.

Through our diverse programs and unwavering commitment, we continue to create a community where every child and family can find strength, support, and a brighter future.

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Placement Services

Orchards Children’s Services provides comprehensive Placement Services to ensure the safety, stability, and well-being of children in need of temporary or permanent homes. Placement Services matches children with nurturing environments that support their emotional, educational, and developmental needs.

Orchards recruits, trains, and supports foster families to care for children who cannot remain with their birth families, offering ongoing training and resources to ensure these families provide safe, loving homes. For children unable to reunify with their families, Orchards facilitates adoption services, guiding families through every step of the process. When possible, children are placed with relatives or close family friends through kinship care, with Orchards offering case management and resources to support caregivers.

Older youth aging out of foster care receive specialized support through youth transition services, helping them achieve independence with resources for housing, education, and employment. Orchards will prioritize safety, placement stability, and permanency planning, collaborating with families and caregivers to develop long-term solutions that are in the child’s best interest.

Grounded in a trauma-informed approach, Orchards trains staff and caregivers to create an environment that promotes safety, healing, and resilience. Through this continuum of care, Orchards strives to provide every child with the opportunity to thrive in a loving and supportive home.

Family Preservation

Orchards Children’s Services Family Preservation Program is dedicated to supporting families overcoming challenges to prevent the need for foster care placements. The program aims to strengthen family bonds, ensure the safety and well-being of children, and empower parents with the tools they need to provide stable and nurturing home environments.

By working closely with families, the program provides tailored services designed to address individual needs. These include in-home counseling, parenting education, and assistance with accessing community resources such as housing, healthcare, and employment support. Caseworkers collaborate with families to develop personalized plans focusing on building skills, resolving conflicts, and creating a safe environment for children to thrive.



The program utilizes a preventative, strength-based approach which helps families overcome barriers before they escalate into crises. With a commitment to keeping children with their families whenever safely possible, the Family Preservation Program reflects our mission to promote stability, resilience, and long-term success for children and their caregivers.

Our experienced team is dedicated to delivering personalized care that aligns with each individual's unique challenges and goals. By fostering a supportive and therapeutic environment, we aim to empower clients on their journey toward recovery and enhanced well-being.

Outpatient Behavioral Health Clinic

Orchards Behavioral Health Clinic specializes in providing comprehensive mental health services to children, adolescents, and adults, focusing on a variety of issues including trauma-related disorders, neurodevelopmental disorders, depression, anxiety, and adjustment disorders.

We utilize a range of evidence-based modalities, including Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (CBT), Acceptance and Commitment Therapy (ACT), and Eye Movement Desensitization and Reprocessing (EMDR) interventions, to effectively address these complex issues. Additionally, our clinic employs creative techniques such as art and play therapy, which are particularly effective in engaging younger clients and facilitating emotional expression and healing.



Trauma Assessment

Orchards Trauma Assessment Program is designed for children involved with Child Protective Services or foster care, and serves as a critical resource for addressing the complex needs of youth referred from a variety of counties within the tri-county area. This program focuses on conducting comprehensive assessments to identify and evaluate the impact of trauma on a child's emotional, psychological, and behavioral functioning.

Children are typically referred to the program due to a range of concerning behaviors or emotional difficulties that may arise as a result of exposure to adverse childhood experiences, such as physical, sexual, or emotional abuse, chronic neglect, community violence, as well as disrupted attachments and placements. These assessments are crucial to provide a detailed understanding of the child's traumatic experiences and their effects, which is essential for developing an individualized treatment plan that targets specific issues. Secondly, thorough assessments help to identify co-occurring conditions, such as anxiety, depression, or learning disabilities, which are often present alongside trauma-related symptoms.

Ultimately, this comprehensive approach aims to empower children on their path to healing and resilience, promoting their overall well-being and future stability.

Domestic Violence Intervention Program

Wayne and Genesee Counties

The Domestic Violence Intervention Program is a vital initiative designed to provide comprehensive clinical services to survivors of domestic violence and their children, operating within both Wayne and Genesee counties. The program offers individual therapy and group therapy sessions tailored to address the unique needs of survivors, fostering a safe environment where participants can explore their experiences, build resilience, and develop coping strategies. Additionally, the program includes a weekly group therapy session specifically for perpetrators of domestic violence, aimed at promoting accountability, understanding the dynamics of abuse, and facilitating behavioral change.

Promise Scholarship

The Orchards Promise Scholarship was established to address common barriers foster care alumni often face when considering post-secondary education. Many struggle to access financial aid and secure stable housing, compounding other challenges like food insecurity, limited access to healthcare, mental health issues, and a lack of social support networks. Without intervention, they risk perpetuating cycles of poverty and instability.

By providing financial assistance, mentorship, and wraparound support services including mental health support, health and dental care, and much more, this comprehensive program—more than just a traditional scholarship—empowers these individuals to overcome challenges, pursue higher education, and achieve their full potential. Dedicated success coaches, who are experienced Orchards social workers, offer round-the-clock support to students, addressing their academic, emotional, and logistical needs. This additional, personalized support system aims to provide guidance and encouragement throughout their college journey, creating a conducive environment for success.

The program offers four avenues of support to address the diverse educational needs of foster care youth, including traditional 4-year college and university scholarships, community college/vocational school support, student loan forgiveness, and emergency education grants for immediate educational needs, including tuition, fees, books, or supplies, ensuring students can overcome unforeseen obstacles.

Parent Education Group-Based Program

Oakland and Macomb Counties

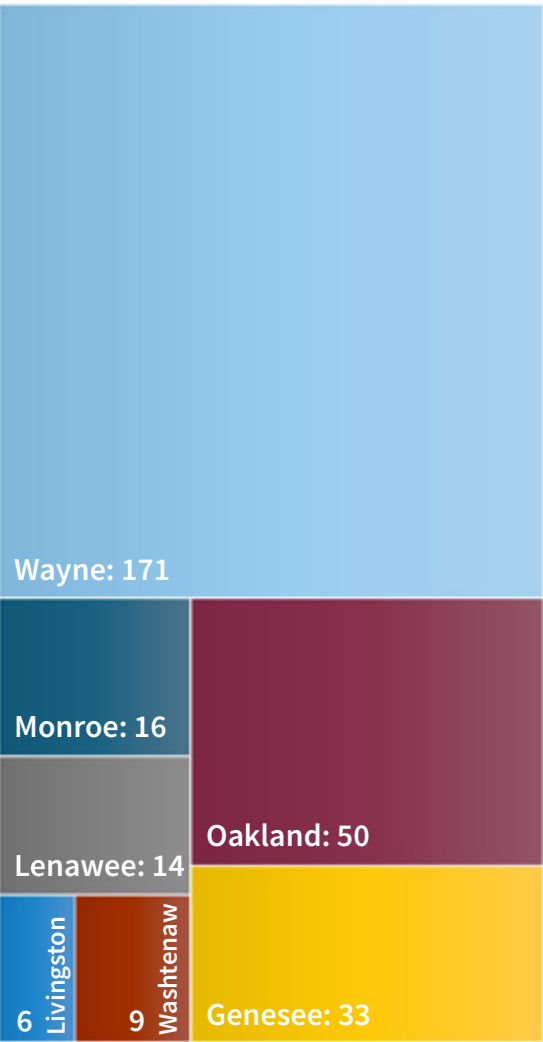
The Parent Education Group-Based Program is a transformative initiative designed to support parents in Oakland and Macomb counties by offering a safe and nurturing environment to enhance their parenting skills. This program provides a structured setting where parents can learn and practice positive parenting strategies, fostering healthier family dynamics and improved relationships. By focusing on shifting negative thinking patterns related to parenting, participants are encouraged to adopt more constructive and empowering perspectives, ultimately leading to improved outcomes for both parents and children.

Foster Care Supportive Visitation

The Foster Care Supportive Visitation Program at Orchards Children’s Services is a vital initiative that strengthens family connections and fosters positive interactions between children in foster care and their biological families. The program provides a safe, nurturing environment where families can bond and work toward the primary goal of family reunification when safely possible. For children, the program maintains vital family bonds, providing stability and reassurance.

Visits take place in the recently renovated Visitation Rooms, designed to promote comfort, safety, and connection. Sessions are supervised by trained Orchards staff who ensure safety and provide coaching to parents, helping them develop essential skills such as communication, conflict resolution, and effective caregiving. A trauma-informed approach is used to address the unique emotional needs of children and families, recognizing the impact of separation and past experiences.

Each family receives a customized visitation plan tailored to their specific circumstances. Supervisors offer real-time feedback during sessions, empowering parents to grow in confidence and capability.

Partner Focus: Ford Philanthropy

The Orchards’ Family Visitation Area was ready for a refresh—and Ford Philanthropy came to the rescue with support during their Ford Global Caring Month!

The Visitation Area at Orchards Children’s Services plays an essential role in the healing and development of the children in our care. It is a space where families can reconnect and create meaningful moments together.

Every year, about 1,000 children and families receive services in the Family Visitation Area located at our headquarters in Southfield. These services focus on supervised interactions between parents, biological relatives, and other family supporters, and children who have been removed from their homes, often due to abuse or neglect, and placed into foster care.

These visits allow children to spend time with their parents in a safe, controlled environment under the supervision of a case worker who observes the parent’s interactions with the child, which is one factor in determining if family reunification is in the client’s best interest.

The old Visitation Area was very well-used and well-loved. With the help of Ford Philanthropy and Dan and Vanessa Fremer, this space was re-envisioned to ensure it incorporates the latest insights on creating trauma-informed, well-resourced, and easily accessible spaces, and that it offers a variety of activities and opportunities for visiting children.

Thanks to our generous supporters, this essential space will continue to be a welcoming space where families and children going through difficult times begin to heal.

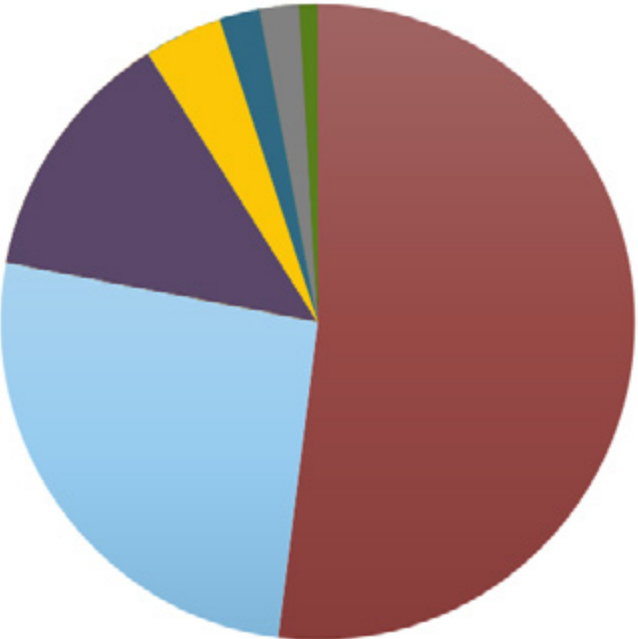
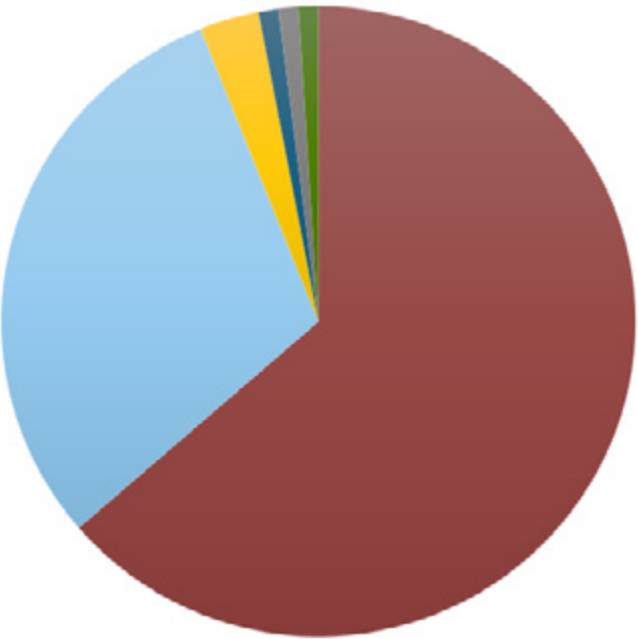
